President & CEO receives Outstanding Women of Color in Education Award

Our President & CEO, Robyn Davis, is in the spotlight for a special honor from the University of Wisconsin System (UW System). Davis is one of 13 women who received the 2022 Outstanding Women of Color in Education Award, an annual honor to recognize achievements in advancing equity and inclusion for people of color within the UW System and communities across the state. More than 400 women of color have been recognized for their transformational work in the 27 years this award has been presented.



"The work that's being done by other women of color and those that represent the LGBTQ+ community is pretty outstanding and impactful, "says Davis, "And then you just think, 'OK, I'm in this group."

UW Green Bay nominated Davis for work done over the years for the people of Brown County. With BCUW, she leads a team whose work with community partners assists households living at or below the ALICE (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) threshold. ALICE households range families to individuals who struggle to make ends meet, despite being employed. Before BCUW, she served Freedom House Ministries' president, helping the county's most vulnerable. And her work doesn't stop there. Davis has received many accomplishments and awards throughout the year for her work in the county.

Grants awarded to middle school groups to kick off service projects

Several Wisconsin middle school student groups will have the unique opportunity to make their mark on communities after being awarded a Character Playbook Community Impact Grant. The \$500 grant from Brown County United Way and the Green Bay Packers will allow students to develop a service project to help their school, neighborhood or community. The project was open not only to all state schools but to nonprofits as well.

"We received nearly 40 project proposals from all across the state," says Cierra Ivey, Brown County United Way's Communication and Engagement Strategist.

"The best part about the review process was listening and interviewing presentations from the middle schoolers. Some of them were very prepared and creative with their presentations. You can tell they wanted to move forward with their service project."

After further review, Brown County United Way and representatives from the Green Bay Packers and Everfi narrowed down to 13 grant recipients, with three being from Brown County.

Bay View Middle School students in Howard are planning a service project that fosters ideals of respect and patriotism by cleaning the Suamico Cemetery. They will be educated on cemetery etiquette, rake leaves, clean up

around headstones, plant flowers and place American flags by veterans' graves.

Wrightstown Middle School plans to grow its tutoring program by getting materials for bonding activities and putting together an end-of-year celebration for everyone involved. They hope to get more students involved and decrease the waitlist for tutors.

A nonprofit, Lovin' the Skin I'm In, serving the greater Green Bay area, will support Black and Brown families currently residing in shelters by providing them with various hair care products catered to textured hair.

All service projects have a supervisor who will guide students to complete their goals at the end of the school year.
